Kindelein Zart

Kindelein zart, von guter Art, was first published in 1915, thirteen years after Wüllner's death. It was included in a compendium of some 610 songs called *Folk Song Book for*

Men's Choir, published at the instigation of Kaiser Wilhelm II. Interesting that the Kaiser could spend some effort on this while he was also directing the early stages of WWI.

The piece is just an extremely sweet Christmas-y lullaby in an immediatly recognizable tradition. No suprises, no jarring chromatics, no fugues, no swelling fortes, just -

"Schlafe, mein Herzchen, schlafe" (s*leep my darling, sleep*).



While certainly an accomplished German pianist, conductor, and composer, Wüllner isn't particularly remarkable. If you start looking around, most people mention that Richard

Wagner didn't like him much (*Wagner didn't like people much in general*) and openly criticized his conducting of the first performance of *Rheingold* in 1869, even after he had the original conductor, Hans Richter, sacked after a dress rehearsal.

English music critic **John Shedlock** reviewed the premiere of Wüllner's *Te Deum*, saying: "a work of great merit, though certainly not epochmaking: it shows a trained and skilful hand, also earnestness of purpose; but it lacks individuality, and, moreover, it has anti-climacteric effects which weaken it."

Nevertheless, Wüllner's work is accessible, competent, and in his *Kindelein Zart*, we hear some deftly-constructed and definitively *Weihmachten* sentimentality.



Mildly interesting random factoid from Wikipedia:

There is a recording fragment in the Thomas Edison National Historical Park archive from 1890 featuring Wüllner at the piano accompanying the singer Karl Mayer in Schubert's 'Wohin?'. This makes Wüllner the earliest-born person whose piano playing has been recorded acoustically.
